Some Words From Intern Eastor Sarah

"Be joyful always, pray continually, and give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." 1 Thessalonians 5:16-18

The past month for me has been one filled with constant running from one activity to the next, to-do lists that never seem to end, grief and loss of loved ones, and continuous fighting and arguing in the news and social media. As I talk to those of you around me, I am hearing many of you feeling the same way! What if that is all we see in the midst of everything going on around us? Sometimes we find ourselves so overcome and overwhelmed with the busyness of life, stress, and negative things that surround us, that we forget to stop and really hear what Paul is saying in 1 Thessalonians! We forget to stop and smell the roses. We get blinded by the bad so that we can't see the blessings in our lives. We start to go forth in our daily tasks with an angry or negative attitude that we then spread to others.

Don't get me wrong, we can feel sad, angry, hurt, lonely...these are real feelings that we have to feel in order to heal but we do not have to let these be the only feelings that we feel. ALL SAINTS DAY

All Souls Day began in the third century to honor martyrs of the Christian Faith. By the seventh and eighth centuries it developed as a way to honor any of the saints of the Church who had attained the full status of heaven. During the early medieval period in the eleventh century, the following day, November 2, came to be observed as All Souls Day to remember those who had died but had not yet achieved the "beatific vision" of heaven, or from the Catholic belief of those who were still in Purgatory. This became a time to pray and intercede for these departed saints.

As with a lot of other excesses of the medieval period, these two days began to accrue a lot of popular mythology and became overlaid with layers of superstition. However, much of what concerns modern Christians actually developed in Ireland and England from Celtic festivals and was imported into the United States by immigrants in the middle 19th century. It was not until the late 19th century that Halloween emerged in its modern Western version, which was then exported to other countries. It is this combination of different beliefs and practices, that of Christianity with pagan beliefs in Halloween that lends a bad reputation to All Saints Day in the minds of some Western Protestant thinking congregations.

Yet beyond those issues, traditionally in the Church the two days of All Saints Day (November 1) and All Souls Day (November 2) were valued as times to celebrate heritage and those Christians of the past who faithfully transmitted the Faith to succeeding generations. Martin Luther actually chose All Saints Eve to send his Ninety Five Theses to the Archbishop. His challenge to the Church and its leaders to reform was set against the background of the heritage of that Church. And even after the Reformation, both Lutheran and Anglican traditions retained the celebration of All Saints Day as a time to honor those who had been faithful.

Today, many Protestant churches combine the two traditional days into the observance of All Saints Day. However, the day focuses not only on honoring departed members of the Church and local congregations, but also those still living who have contributed to the work and ministry of the Church in significant ways. Since most years November 1 falls on a weekday and most Protestant churches do not have weekday services, usually the Sunday following November 1 is cele-

brated as All Saints.

Here at Prairie Lutheran Parish, we will celebrate All Saints Day by remembering those who have faithfully departed since our last All Saints Day. They include:

Stanley Area Care for Kids

Nearly one in six children in America live in a household that struggles to put food on the table. That means they struggle with hunger sometime during the year. The Stanley Park District, Mountrail County Health Foundation and the Stanley Public Schools have teamed up with local churches to help with the fact that there are children in our area who are not getting the nutritious food they need on a regular basis.

Established in the summer of 2017, S.A.C.K., which just received its 501c3 non-profit status, will offer a supply of nutritious meals and snacks for children over their weekends and extended breaks, free of charge. Elementary students will be bringing home a prebagged sack. The sacks are distributed by their teacher on the last school day before the weekend or break.

In the near future, at the high school, there will be an actual space where the food will be stocked and the students may come in and shop for the food they need at a time that works for them.

Any child enrolled in the Stanley School District is able to receive these weekly sacks of food. Please pray fully consider donating the needed food it takes to feed over 30 children from 13 families each week. Black totes are located in your church lobby or at the front of Cash Wise. We thank you so much for your help on this.

A Monthly Update from the Western North Dakota Synod Office



Praise God!

We are in the season of thanks! Fall festivals in some congregations, harvest festivals in others, Women's Thank Offering Services and plans being put in place for Thanksgiving Services. We, as followers of the risen Bishop Mark Narum Christ have much to be thankful for this day and every

day. I am thankful for the faithful servants who quietly make sure their church is warm and welcoming for all to come and experience God's grace. I am thankful for those who put on pots of coffee and provide lunches for a variety of gatherings. I am thankful for those who come and worship – hear and taste of God's grace and then go back to their daily lives being the faithful servants they have been called to be through their daily acts of Christcentered service. I am thankful for our rostered leaders.

This list could continue to go on – and it should. I ask you to take some time, right now to lift a word of thanks to God. The list is long, we are blessed indeed.

Amazing News...

I am amazed by the generosity of people across this synod. In mid October your synod Endowment Committee gathered. The committee was able to capture \$92,310 in gains to be used as scholarships and grants next year. This means over \$64,800 the Ministry Endowment will be able to give as scholarships to seminary students from Western North Dakota or for debt buy down for rostered leaders serving in our synod. It means the Mission Endowment will have over \$21,700 to help support Christ centered ministries in our synod and as seed money for new ministries. It also means there will be over \$5,000 for the committee to continue to do its work. The committee also learned that the newest branch of the Endowment, the Accompaniment fund which was approved at this past summers synod assembly has already received \$10,500 in gifts. We are blessed by many generous people in this synod – thanks for your faithfulness.

Planting More Seeds...

Gifts to the Synod Endowment Fund is like planting seeds. Financial gifts given now-grow over time. That growth allows for an annual financial harvest. As you read earlier we are so thankful for the gifts already given — so that scholarships and grants can be given which help in telling the Good News of Jesus Christ. As the end of the year draws near I would like to invite you to consider a gift to the Endowment Fund. You have the choice of giving a gift to one of the three branches of the fund — Ministry Fund for seminary scholarships, Mission Fund for grants to crucial ministries in the synod and Accompaniment Fund to insure there are synod staff people to help raise up new candidates to pastors and deacons in the synod. A gift of \$5,000 or more can qualify for the state tax credit — check with your CPA or financial advisor about this tax benefit. You should also know that gifts of stock are also accepted — again check with your tax professional to see how this might be a benefit to you. The bottom line, any gift in any amount is a blessing! Such gifts will continue to support ministry for generations to come.

The "Why" of it all...

In October, we were glad to welcome Grace Duddy Pomeroy to Minot. Grace is a young woman of deep faith who finds great joy in talking about stewardship. She challenged us to continuously tell the "Why" of our ministry. Grace is a millennial, active in her church and convinced that younger people do care about supporting ministry – but they want to know "Why" they should give. She says people of her generation want to know how people's lives are being changed through the money they give. What are the stories your congregation could share about lives changed and people served through the proclamation of the Gospel? You can read more of Grace's thoughts in the book "Embracing Stewardship."

"The Pantry"

The Prairie Lutheran Parish will be teaming up with other local churches, the Stanley Park District, Mountrail County Health Foundation and the Stanley Public Schools to help with the fact that children in our area are not getting the nutritious food they need on a regular basis. Nearly one in six children in America lives in households that struggle to put food on the table. That means they struggle with hunger sometime during the year.

Starting on Friday, September 8th, "The Portable Pantry" will allow children in the Stanley elementary school that are on the free or reduced meals program to bring home a bag of food each Friday. Each week a group will get together in a classroom at the Elementary school and bag up the food for each child designated in a reusable grocery bag.

In the near future, "The Pantry" will be setup at the high school where students can go shop for what they need.

Informational brochures and applications for this program will be available at each local church and at the Grade School and High School guidance counselors' offices.

Cashwise has graciously approved to mark the food items The Pantry board has chosen for the month so shoppers can pick up items as they shop. A large tote will be placed up front for drop off of the food purchased by shoppers.

The local churches are spearheading this campaign with seed money to start it off with and food donations. Grants will also be applied for once The Pantry has its 501c3 accreditation. But, this is a community effort, so any service organization that would like to help bag food for a week, donate food or money or help with any needed movement of food please contact Steph Everett at 628-1405 or talk to Sarah Sorenson or Eden Cuypers!

If you are interested in helping pack bags of food for the elementary school for our S.A.C.K Program, We will be packing at 5:00 on the dates listed. Please let Pastoral Intern Sarah know if you are interested in helping. We need 4-5 helpers each time and it takes about an hour to pack the bags. Thank you!

Mountrail County Food Pantry is a Prairie Lutheran Parish supported ministry.

The food pantry served 50 families in the month of September, for a total of 153 people, 66 being children and 17 being seniors. We provided 5968 pounds of food. We were also the happy recipients of 442.6 pounds of garden produce in September!! How wonderful to be able to give out fresh homegrown produce!! © The Women of Today donated some items, including some pulled pork, which is a great hit with our clients! Whiting held a drive for us, and then delivered several hundred pounds of food for us!! We are so fortunate to operate in a community that cares so much about each other!! We will be receiving some equipment/shelving from the Great Plains Food Bank in October, all from a grant that was accepted for award!! Hunger in Mountrail County

An estimated 850 individuals, or one in 18 of your Mountrail County neighbors turned to the Great Plains Food Bank partner agencies and feeding programs to meet their nutritional needs in 2016.

Social Ministry Glimpse Child Care Aware Start-Up Consulting

Child Care Aware has five consultants available to help people who want to be child care providers through the start-up process. Start-up services are offered from the time someone is considering opening a program, through the licensing process, until they have completed their first year as a licensed program and then applied re-licensure. CCA Start-Up Consulting has helped programs with technical assistance covering such topics as reducing health and safety risks, how to set up a great child care space, planning for children and the basics of owning your own business.

In the past year, 175 programs have received technical assistance in 64 communities.

Social Ministry Spotlight Aging Life Care Management

Aging Life Care™ professionals help find solutions in times of uncertainty; provide guidance and support to ensure quality care and well-being for loved ones; thus reducing worry, stress and time off for family caregivers. Tailored to the senior's need, services: assess and monitor; plan and problem solve; educate and advocate; support both care receiver and caregiver. As assisted living, and nursing home care costs continue to rise, Aging Life Care can coordinate necessary supports in the home, often at a much lower cost.

In the past year, 47 families connected with care managers to navigate health-care options in a flexible, person-centered manner.


